


Congratulations to Teresa Brown

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Teaching during a Pandemic

The following are things that you will hear daily in my classroom during the current pandemic. These are things I never in my 23 years of teaching have heard or said until now.

*"I can't find my water bottle." And "I left my water bottle at home." Students aren't allowed to drink from the water fountains, hence the need for individual bottles.

*"I think I accidentally threw my lunch card away." Students have a lunch card with their number that they show to the lunch lady behind Plexiglas. The ladies can't hear behind the glass, and the students are no longer allowed to type their numbers in.

*"Ms. Hardison, did you remember to hit record?" And "Ms. Hardison, did you remember to stop recording?" It's a real struggle to teach students in person and remember to record each lesson for the 25% of my students that are at home doing virtual learning. *"Go stand on your circle." Every student has a circle he or she stands on when lining up to help with social distancing.

*"Ms. Hardison, have you cleaned the desks yet?" Students' desks are cleaned with disinfectant between each class. Students know to stand on their circle until I can clean all the desks.

Honestly, this is the hardest year I have ever had. The virtual learning has been beyond challenging with both the technology and parents of virtual students. Sadly, many parents signed up for virtual because they didn't want to get up every morning to take their child to school or thought it would be easier than "real school". Unfortunately, a couple of the parents aren't helping, assisting, or guiding their children at all during the virtual lessons, and their children are suffering greatly academically. Thankfully, my in-person teaching is going pretty well. The students in my actual classroom are sweet and so happy to be at school. They are eager to learn and have adapted well to all the changes. *They make me laugh and remind me daily why I am in this profession.--* Andrea Hardison

What is Normal?

As years have passed in my years of teaching I have always looked forward to meeting with all my children on the carpet area every morning. They would share stories, thoughts, and silly things they had brought. This carpet area is where we bonded. We learned together there. We danced together there. We sang songs there. We even listened to wonderful imaginative stories there that would take us to a different place just for awhile each day. We often had many unexpected impromptu life lessons learned there. They were free to go to the classroom library and pull books to read and enjoy.

Now our new "normal" routine consist of children entering the classroom and immediately going to a chair and sitting there from the beginning to the ending of class, leaving the seat to go to lunch and to their pull out. Sometimes the children can't see my face for the covering of the mask when I am going to be working in close proximity with them since we do lots of oral testing. My children now sit at those seats and listen to a story that I hold up in front of the class. They choose books from an electronic library on the computer instead of a shelf. They no longer can high five their buddy for a congratulatory celebration. Children have lost lots of freedoms. They have strict procedures they now follow such as gel in or out, stand on a dot for social distancing, no tag being played on the playground, or Duck Duck Goose. These children are brave and adapting well.

Yes, I have had my moments of tears, anger, frustration and fear as we have been bombarded with a vast, ever so swiftly changing way of educating our children. Things are happening so fast with decisions related to the Covid in the schools that we can hardly process in thought until another change is made. I have worked longer hours, watched many tutorials online, taken many notes and attended more training to be prepared for the virtual teaching that takes place in my classroom and for what could be the unknown that could happen. It seems we are preparing for the unknown constantly while teaching in the known. A balancing act that requires so much organization that my head is constantly spinning.

Normal defined as a noun is the usual, average or typical state or condition. Defined as an adjective, normal is conforming to a standard, usual, typical or expected.

I feel like we have moved away from the normal of teaching we knew as defined from a noun to a new normal that is defined as an adjective. Teachers keep moving forward and adapting as we accept the challenges we are given. We know that God has provided a way for us to deal with these challenges. Many have asked what they can do to help, but the things that need to be done these days are not physical acts, but spiritual. Please pray for teachers and our students and pray for the leadership of our country as they make decisions they once thought they would not be making due to the pandemic. Pray for our country.

There is so much more that could be written, but you really have to experience it to understand it. -- Carla Caldwell
